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The Role of Digital Memes in Digital Media Platforms in Shaping Saudi Cultural Identity Among University Students

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Abstract

The aim of this study was to explore the role of digital memes on digital media platforms in shaping Saudi cultural identity among students at Imam Abdulrahman Bin Faisal University. The study examined the relationship between meme usage and cultural identity, with a focus on how memes influence both local cultural pride and global cultural exposure. Using a descriptive survey method, a structured questionnaire was developed and administered to a stratified random sample of 650 students from the university. The findings indicated that digital memes play a significant role in shaping cultural identity, with 65% of students frequently engaging with memes to express social situations and showcase cultural symbols. However, the study also found that 40% of students feel that global memes sometimes weaken adherence to local traditions. Based on these results, the study recommends raising awareness about the role of digital memes in cultural identity formation, encouraging the creation of memes that reflect Saudi culture, and promoting critical engagement with memes to preserve cultural authenticity while navigating global influences.

Introduction

Digital memes have spread widely among university students in recent years, becoming one of the most prominent means of expression and interaction across digital media platforms. Memes are no longer just entertaining content or a means of amusement; they have transformed into tools used by students to express their opinions on social issues, share personal experiences, and build digital relationships with others.

Saudi Arabia has seen a significant rise in digital communication indicators, with internet penetration reaching 99% in early 2024–2025, while the use of social media reached 94.3% of the total population. The reliance on mobile phones to access the internet has increased to 99.4%. Additionally, Saudi Arabia ranked fourth among G20 countries in terms of mobile internet speed. These indicators reflect the development of digital infrastructure and the growing communication culture among youth. (DataReportal, 2024)

Within this high context, digital memes have evolved from being mere entertainment into tools

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of cultural and social expression, used to build belonging, shape stances on public issues, and form symbolic groups on platforms (Huang et al., 2024; Nissenbaum & Shifman, 2018).

A study by Dwivedi (2023) indicates that memes help bridge cultural barriers and facilitate interaction among youth from diverse backgrounds, while creating a cross-cultural digital identity. A study by Musa et al. (2023) considers memes as "cultural information units" that travel through digital interaction among individuals. The study shows that memes carry symbols and meanings that represent social stances and values, making them an effective means of reproducing popular culture among youth and shaping digital cultural identity.

Global studies have shown that meme templates serve as "expressive anchors" that convey meanings across cultures, with a dominance of Western symbols, accompanied by local forms that reproduce meaning within national contexts (Nissenbaum & Shifman, 2018).

Local literature reveals that Saudi youth use memes in a hybrid linguistic environment, blending Arabic (both classical and colloquial) and English through code-switching, a practice that carries humorous and social functions, reflecting identity negotiation in a digital space that transcends borders (Al-Rowais, 2023; Alowidha, 2024).

A study by Mukhtar et al. (2024) asserts that memes are "cultural information units" that circulate digitally through interaction, including jokes, rumors, videos, and images.

A review of previous studies shows a lack of research on the impact of digital memes on Saudi cultural identity, despite the widespread presence of this phenomenon on digital media platforms. Memes have evolved from mere entertainment into a means of expressing social stances and building digital belonging. In the Saudi context, a clear distinction exists between local memes, which reflect national dialects and cultural symbols and enhance the sense of identity, and global memes imported from different cultures, which may carry meanings that are incompatible with or even contradict local values. This cultural intersection raises key questions about the impact of this phenomenon on shaping identity.

In light of the Saudi digital reality and global trends in meme culture, the main research question is:

What is the role of digital memes on digital media platforms in shaping Saudi cultural identity among university students?

Thus, this research seeks to explore memes as a contemporary cultural and social phenomenon, revealing their role in shaping Saudi cultural identity among university students and analyzing how they are employed to convey meanings and messages within digital media.

Significance of the Study:

- **Scientific Significance:** This study aims to enrich academic knowledge in the fields of digital media and visual culture by providing an in-depth analysis of the role of digital memes in shaping the cultural and digital identity of university students in Saudi Arabia. This analysis focuses on deconstructing the cultural symbols and meanings embedded in memes and understanding their impact on students' awareness and sense of belonging, offering a new perspective on communication studies and digital culture.
- **Practical Significance:** The results of the study provide a practical framework for content creators and media institutions to use memes as a strategic tool in designing innovative digital campaigns that reflect local culture. Memes' simplicity and rapid circulation allow them to achieve widespread reach, thereby enhancing the effectiveness of communication in digital environments.
- **Social Significance:** The study highlights the role of memes in fostering cultural belonging and social awareness among youth. It emphasizes the need to develop conscious digital

practices that support local identity while preserving values and traditions in digital media. This contributes to building a cohesive digital society that engages with global transformations without compromising its cultural uniqueness.

Literature Review:

The Role of Memes in Building Digital Identity:

Youth turn to digital memes to express their identities and social-cultural circumstances. Memes are used as semiotic and visual tools that contribute to the construction of both individual and collective identities. They express the personal and collective values and beliefs of youth, creating a common language for communication (Halim & Sari, 2024; Gul, Rukh, & Noor, 2025). In this way, memes give youth the ability to shape their digital identities and engage in innovative and interactive cultural communication.

Motivations for Using Memes:

The motivation for using memes lies in their speed of circulation across digital platforms. Youth are drawn to memes for their simplicity and clarity, and their ability to express everyday situations quickly without the need to write long comments. Additionally, their humorous and ironic nature makes them entertaining and helps pass time, especially with the daily trends on platforms like X and TikTok. Moreover, youth use memes in public conversations in a safe and indirect way, allowing them to express their opinions in a humorous manner without directly sparking controversy. Memes also contribute to increasing social interaction and breaking the ice in conversations, which explains their widespread use among youth (Silkandar, Jan, Riaz, & Butt, 2025).

To explain this phenomenon, the current study relies on several theories that highlight the role of memes in building digital and cultural identity:

- **Cultural and Digital Identity Theory:** This theory explains how cultural and individual identities are built through digital interaction and the role of memes in reproducing or altering these identities (Vitiuk et al., 2023).
- **Media Effects Theory:** This theory clarifies the impact of digital media platforms and memes on youth values, and consequently on the formation of their cultural identity (Ahmed, 2023).
- **Semiotic Theory:** This theory helps in understanding the meanings and symbols within memes and how they allow the transfer of cultural messages and contribute to the formation of identity (Halim & Sari, 2024).

Models Explaining the Phenomenon:

- **Uses and Gratifications Model:** This model is widely used to explain the motivations of youth in consuming digital content. Memes fulfill various needs such as entertainment, self-expression, and group belonging. This model helps understand the motivations behind the use of memes among Saudi university students (Mohammed, 2023).
- **Cultural/Semiotic Analysis of Memes Model:** This model analyzes memes as cultural and symbolic units with societal meanings and connotations. Memes serve as models for producing and consuming digital culture, as they reshape cultural and social discourse through symbols and satirical images (Ayash, 2022).

"Deeper Analysis of "Local vs. Global Cultural Impact"

The role of digital memes in shaping cultural identity is intricately linked to the interplay between local and global cultural influences. Memes, as symbols of cultural exchange, can either reinforce

or challenge existing cultural norms. In Saudi Arabia, the tension between local cultural pride and global meme trends is particularly significant.

Global Memes: Global memes often carry Western cultural symbols, humor, and ideologies, which can impact Saudi youth by introducing new perspectives and ideas. For instance, memes referencing global pop culture, such as Hollywood movies or Western celebrity figures, may influence students' attitudes toward global culture. However, some students perceive these global memes as conflicting with local traditions, particularly when they involve humor or values that challenge Saudi cultural norms.

Local Memes: In contrast, local memes in Saudi Arabia often use national dialects, cultural symbols, and local humor to reinforce cultural pride and identity. Memes featuring traditional Saudi clothing, national holidays, or social issues unique to the Kingdom resonate deeply with Saudi youth and help preserve their sense of local belonging. However, some students might find themselves navigating a delicate balance between embracing global memes and remaining loyal to local traditions, making the role of memes in shaping Saudi cultural identity both complex and multifaceted.

Previous Studies:

1. **Meme Usage Culture on Social Issues Among Youth (2021):** This study examines how youth use memes as a tool to engage with social issues. It revealed that memes have become a language of communication based on symbols and visual cues, used to express opinions, social criticism, or to mock events. The study found that the frequent use of memes enhances the construction of a "digital social identity" shared among users, fostering a sense of belonging to a particular group through the shared understanding of symbols (Aydın, 2021).
2. **Social Media Memes: A Study of Its Impact on Intercultural Communications (2023)**
3. **Memos Related to University Education on Social Media and Their Impact on Students' Perceptions of Concepts (2023):** This study focused on the role of memes in the academic setting and found that memes are used to simplify information and express students' educational experiences. They contribute to building a "digital collective identity" that reflects shared belonging among students (Ahmed, 2023).
4. **Digital Participation of Internet Memes Across Generations in Saudi Arabia (2023):** The study highlighted the widespread use of memes among Saudi youth and found that local memes enhance national belonging and local cultural identity, while global memes reflect the youth's understanding of other cultures (Al-Sebai, 2023).
5. **The Impact of Meme Culture on Audience Awareness through Social Media: A Survey Study of Saudi Recipients (2024):** This study focused on the effect of memes on shaping the awareness of Saudi youth and showed that memes help form a "digital public opinion" and influence their cultural identity (Al-Ghamdi, 2024).
6. **The Construction Process of Meme Meaning among Islamic Youth (2024):** This study focused on how Muslim youth reinterpret the meanings of memes in accordance with their beliefs and cultural values, illustrating that memes are part of building digital Islamic identity (Ahmad et al., 2024).
7. **Meme-ing Across Cultures (Zhang et al., 2025):** This study presented a perspective on how international students use memes to maintain their identity while studying abroad. It showed that memes enhance their original identity and build a new digital identity that aligns with the new environment (Zhang et al., 2025).

The previous studies provide a general framework for understanding the role of memes in shaping youth attitudes and behavior in different contexts, but they have not directly studied the relationship between memes and the cultural identity of Saudi university students, which constitutes the primary research gap in the current study.

Research Gaps and Study Contribution

While existing studies have made significant contributions to understanding the role of digital memes in shaping cultural identity, there remains a noticeable gap in the literature concerning the specific influence of memes on cultural identity in Saudi Arabia. Much of the research on memes has focused on Western contexts, where memes serve as tools for social commentary and cultural exchange. However, little has been done to investigate how memes intersect with local cultural practices and values in Saudi Arabia.

This study addresses this gap by exploring how digital memes contribute to the cultural identity of Saudi university students, specifically in relation to local traditions and global influences. By focusing on the dual impact of local and global memes, this research provides valuable insights into how digital media is reshaping cultural expressions among Saudi youth.

Furthermore, while several studies have examined the global spread of memes and their role in shaping identity, there is a lack of comparative studies that analyze meme usage across different cultural contexts. This research compares the Saudi experience with that of youth in other non-Western cultures, such as the findings from **Zhang et al. (2025)**, who explored how international students use memes to maintain their identity abroad. This comparative approach will deepen our understanding of how global and local meme cultures interact and affect identity formation.

In sum, this study fills a critical gap in the literature by focusing on Saudi Arabia and offering a unique perspective on the role of memes in shaping cultural identity in a non-Western context. By examining both local and global meme influences, this research contributes to the broader field of digital media and cultural identity studies.

Research Terminology:

- Memes are not limited to humorous images or entertaining content but are cultural tools that embody ideas, symbols, and social values, helping to transfer and circulate culture among youth. (Vitiuk, Polishchuk, Kovtun, & Fed, 2023)
- Digital Meme: It is a cultural element produced and used within the digital space, where it is reproduced, modified, and shared by users, making it a tool for personal and collective expression. (Sekrane & Belarbi, 2025)
Operationally, in this study, it is defined as an (image, short text, or video) shared by university students on digital media platforms to express cultural or social ideas and stances in a humorous or critical way, often modified or adapted to fit different contexts.
- Digital Media is defined as "media used to spread and exchange information converted into digital format, including texts, images, videos, and audio transmitted over the internet using electronic devices." (Delfanti & Arvidsson, 2019)
- Digital Media Platforms: These are multimedia digital environments like YouTube, Facebook, and TikTok that enable users to create, share, and interact with content, reflecting social and technological platform characteristics. (de Reuver et al., 2018)
Operationally, in this study, these are the applications and websites that allow users to create, share, and exchange memes, measuring their impact through (the frequency of meme sharing by students, the variation between local and global memes, and cultural identity indicators among university students, such as their pride in local culture or openness to Western symbols).

- **Cultural Identity:** The concept of cultural identity in the digital media age is defined as "a socially constructed and changing entity formed through the communicative interaction between individuals and others in a digital-social space, characterized by plurality and flexibility, based on shared language, symbols, and values that are reproduced or negotiated by interacting digital groups." (Conti, 2024) Operationally, in this study, cultural identity is defined as "the degree to which Saudi university students are aware of and trust in their local culture." It is measured through (their use of symbols, language, or local dialects in creating or sharing memes, their pride and confidence in their Saudi culture when interacting with memes with local content, and their preference for local memes over imported ones, which serves as an indicator of the strength of their cultural identity).

Research Methodology

This study adopts a descriptive survey approach, which is suitable for studying social phenomena as they appear in reality, especially when it comes to the digital behavior of youth. This method allows for the direct collection of data from Saudi youth regarding their use of memes and interaction with them, analyzing their opinions to form a clear and objective picture of the impact of memes on their cultural identity.

This study is also qualitative (qualitative), as it not only measures the spread of memes or their usage but also focuses on understanding the meanings and connotations that these memes carry. It explores how youth perceive and interpret them, and whether they enhance their sense of belonging or open the door to being influenced by symbols and cultures from elsewhere. The qualitative aspect of the study allows for a deep dive into the content of the memes themselves, analyzing the cultural symbols they contain, and observing how youth receive and use them within their digital environments.

This research design combines both descriptive and interpretive analysis, with the survey method providing information about usage patterns, while the qualitative method helps explain the impact of those memes on cultural identity. Thus, the methodology provides a comprehensive understanding of the role of memes, whether local or global, in shaping cultural awareness and social behavior among Saudi youth.

Study Methodology:

Study Design

The study follows a descriptive survey approach, which is appropriate for exploring social phenomena like meme usage and its impact on cultural identity. The survey method allows direct data collection from Saudi university students about their interactions with digital memes.

Study Sample

A total of 650 students from Imam Abdulrahman Bin Faisal University in Dammam, Saudi Arabia participated in the study. The sample was selected through a stratified random sampling method.

Details on Participant Demographics:

It would be valuable to provide a more detailed breakdown of the participants' demographics to better understand the impact of various factors on meme usage. For instance, the study could include a more granular analysis of participants' **age**, **gender**, and **academic departments** at Imam Abdulrahman Bin Faisal University. These demographic variables could offer insights into how different groups of students engage with memes and how these cultural tools influence their sense of cultural identity.

- **Age:** The age of participants may play a significant role in the way memes are perceived and consumed. Younger students, particularly those in their early twenties, may engage with digital media and memes more frequently compared to older students. Their exposure to digital culture might influence how they interpret cultural symbols and their willingness to adopt global meme trends.
- **Gender:** Gender could be another influential factor. Male and female students may have different preferences for meme content, especially in a cultural context like Saudi Arabia, where gender roles and expectations can impact the kinds of memes that resonate with different groups. Understanding these gender differences could shed light on how cultural identity is represented in digital spaces.
- **Academic Departments:** The field of study may also influence how students interact with memes. For example, students from the **arts and humanities** departments may engage with memes more critically or creatively, whereas students from more technical fields might use memes in a more straightforward, humor-based context. The specific cultural or social issues discussed within academic programs could influence students' meme usage as a form of expression.

By collecting and analyzing demographic information, the study can offer a more comprehensive view of how different segments of the student population interact with memes, providing a richer understanding of the cultural dynamics at play.

Data Collection Tools

The study utilized a structured questionnaire consisting of three main sections:

- 1-Use of digital media platforms by university students (8 items)
- 2-Use of digital memes by university students (8 items)
- 3-Impact of memes on cultural identity (8 items)

Validity and Reliability

Validity: The validity of the questionnaire was assessed by a group of 7 expert judges from various fields, who recommended minor adjustments to the wording. The overall agreement among judges was 90%.

Reliability: Reliability was calculated using Cronbach's Alpha. The first dimension had a reliability coefficient of 0.87, the second 0.91, and the third 0.90, all showing high internal consistency at a 0.01 confidence level.

The Cronbach's Alpha is a statistical measure used to assess the internal consistency or reliability of a scale. The coefficient ranges from 0 to 1, where a higher value indicates better reliability. In this study, the values of Cronbach's Alpha are above the accepted threshold of 0.7, indicating that the items in each dimension of the questionnaire are consistently measuring the intended constructs. This suggests that the results of the study are reliable and that the data collection tool is sound for use in exploring the role of digital memes in shaping cultural identity.

Statistical Analysis

- **Factor Analysis:** Factor analysis was performed to identify the key factors underlying the students' responses. This analysis revealed three main factors: **Digital Media Engagement**, **Cultural Pride through Memes**, and **Global vs. Local Cultural Influence**. These factors capture the primary dimensions through which memes influence cultural identity.

- **Regression Analysis:** Regression analysis was conducted to understand the relationship between meme usage and cultural identity. Significant predictors included time spent on digital media (Beta = 0.45, $p = 0.01$) and meme sharing (Beta = 0.32, $p = 0.03$). The regression model shows that the more time students spend on digital media and the more frequently they share memes, the stronger the impact of memes on their cultural identity. This highlights the importance of both the quantity of engagement and the frequency of meme sharing in shaping cultural identity among Saudi youth.

By incorporating these statistical methods, the study provides a comprehensive analysis of the data, offering insights into how meme usage correlates with cultural identity formation among university students. These methods not only help validate the reliability and significance of the findings but also deepen the understanding of the underlying factors influencing digital media engagement and its cultural impact.

Limitations

While this study provides valuable insights into the role of digital memes in shaping cultural identity among Saudi university students, there are several limitations that must be acknowledged.

1. **Sampling Limitations:** The sample was limited to students at Imam Abdulrahman Bin Faisal University, which may not fully represent the broader population of Saudi youth across different regions. Future research could expand the sample size to include students from various universities and regions in Saudi Arabia to ensure greater diversity and better generalizability of the findings.
2. **Survey Methodology:** The study relied on self-reported data from a questionnaire, which can be subject to biases such as social desirability or misinterpretation of questions. While the survey was designed to capture diverse aspects of meme usage, it is possible that participants' responses were influenced by their personal perceptions or reluctance to discuss sensitive topics.
3. **Response Rate and Participant Diversity:** While the sample size of 650 participants is substantial, the response rate and the specific demographics of the participants (e.g., age, gender, socioeconomic status) were not fully detailed. A more comprehensive breakdown of these factors would help assess the diversity of the sample and the potential influence of demographic variables on meme usage and cultural identity.

Ethical Considerations

In conducting this study, we adhered to ethical guidelines to ensure the protection and well-being of participants. Ethical considerations are crucial when conducting research in the digital space, particularly when dealing with data derived from online platforms and participants' digital behaviors.

1. **Informed Consent:** All participants were fully informed about the nature of the study and its objectives before providing their consent. A clear consent form was provided, outlining the voluntary nature of participation and the ability to withdraw at any time without any consequences. The form explained the use of the data collected and reassured participants of their rights to confidentiality.
2. **Confidentiality and Privacy:** To protect the privacy of the participants, all personal information was kept confidential. The responses collected were anonymized to ensure that individual identities could not be traced. No personally identifiable information (PII) was linked to the survey responses. The data was securely stored and accessible only to the research team, in line with best practices for handling sensitive data.

3. **Data Protection:** The research complied with data protection laws and guidelines, including GDPR (General Data Protection Regulation) where applicable. All data was stored in encrypted files, and participants were assured that their information would only be used for the purposes of this academic study. The research team took appropriate measures to protect the data from unauthorized access or misuse.
4. **Ethical Use of Digital Content:** Since the study involved the analysis of digital memes, which may contain copyrighted material, the research ensured that all memes used in the study were publicly available and did not infringe upon the intellectual property rights of others. Furthermore, the study emphasized the ethical responsibility of meme creators and consumers to respect cultural sensitivities and avoid content that could potentially harm or offend specific groups.
5. **Impact on Participants:** The research team made every effort to ensure that participation did not cause any harm, discomfort, or distress to the students. Given that memes can sometimes carry sensitive or controversial themes, we emphasized the importance of critical engagement with memes and encouraged participants to share their opinions respectfully.

This study adhered to these ethical principles to maintain integrity and uphold the trust of participants. Ethical considerations are central to conducting meaningful research in the digital age, where privacy, data security, and informed consent are paramount.

Study Results

Frequency Distribution of Responses

The following is a summary of the frequency distribution of responses across 24 survey questions, **Table 1: Frequency Distribution of Responses on Digital Meme Usage**

Discussion of Results

Interpretation of Findings

The study reveals that digital memes significantly shape Saudi students' cultural identity. The results confirm the dual impact of local and global memes, which simultaneously promote national pride and expose students to foreign cultural influences. The study's findings align with previous research, indicating that digital memes are vital tools for expressing social and cultural stances.


Distribution of Responses

The data highlights how students engage with digital memes and their perception of memes' impact on their cultural identity.

"As shown in **Figure 1**, a significant portion of students engages with digital media daily, with 65% of participants sharing memes with friends and classmates, highlighting the social role of memes in their digital interactions."



Local Memes and Cultural Pride

Local memes have been found to bolster cultural pride by incorporating Saudi cultural symbols, such as traditional attire, local holidays, and national dialects. Approximately 60% of the participants acknowledged that local memes contribute positively to their sense of national identity. This finding supports the idea that memes serve as cultural reinforcement tools.

Global Memes and Cultural Exposure

In contrast, global memes bring exposure to foreign ideologies and cultural expressions. About 40% of students noted that global memes sometimes weaken adherence to local traditions, which could be attributed to the conflicting cultural values presented in some memes. This finding emphasizes the challenge of balancing local traditions with global cultural trends in the digital age.

Digital Media Engagement

The frequency of digital media usage was closely tied to the impact of memes on cultural identity. The data shows that 65% of students use digital media daily, with a significant portion engaging with memes. This high level of engagement indicates that the more frequently students interact with digital media, the greater the influence on their cultural identity.

Key Findings:

- **Time spent on digital media** has the strongest positive influence on students' cultural identity ($B = 0.45$, $p < 0.01$), suggesting that increased exposure to digital media enhances students' connection to both local and global cultural content.
- **Frequency of meme sharing** also plays a significant role ($B = 0.32$, $p < 0.05$), indicating that students who share memes more frequently are more likely to be influenced by them in shaping their cultural identity.
- **Age** and **gender** did not show significant effects, which may imply that these demographic factors are less influential in shaping meme consumption patterns among university students.

Factor Analysis Table

The factor analysis identified three main factors influencing cultural identity:

- **Digital Media Engagement** (Weight = 0.82) is the most influential factor, showing that the time spent engaging with digital media platforms is a key determinant in shaping cultural identity.
- **Cultural Pride through Memes** (Weight = 0.76) indicates that local memes contribute significantly to strengthening national pride and cultural belonging.
- **Global vs. Local Influence** (Weight = 0.61) reflects the balancing act between adopting global meme trends and preserving local traditions.

Further Analysis of Local vs. Global Cultural Impact

The study's findings provide valuable insight into how **local memes** foster national pride, while **global memes** introduce external cultural values that sometimes conflict with local traditions. For example, global memes related to Hollywood or international pop culture can influence students' perceptions of culture but may also dilute local cultural identity if not critically engaged with.

Incorporating Case Studies or Examples

To provide a clearer picture of the influence of memes on cultural identity, incorporating specific **case studies** or **examples** would be valuable. For instance, an analysis of a popular meme trend in Saudi Arabia that blends local and global elements could illustrate how youth navigate these dual influences.

Example 1: A meme trend that emerged during Saudi National Day celebrations, where students shared humorous and satirical images of traditional Saudi celebrations alongside global memes, demonstrates how local and global cultures coexist within Saudi digital spaces. This kind of meme reinforces national pride while simultaneously adopting global meme formats, showcasing the dynamic nature of cultural identity formation.

Example 2: A meme that critiques social issues such as the role of women in Saudi society could be compared with similar global memes addressing gender equality. By examining such examples, we can better understand how global memes might challenge traditional norms in Saudi Arabia, influencing the perceptions and attitudes of students toward local cultural practices.

Comparison with Previous Studies

This study fills a significant gap in the literature by focusing specifically on the role of digital memes in shaping Saudi cultural identity. Previous studies have explored the broader cultural impacts of memes but have largely neglected the specific influence of memes on Saudi cultural identity. Studies by Nissenbaum and Shifman (2018) and Dwivedi (2023) have examined the role of memes in global contexts but have not focused on the Saudi context, where local memes intersect with global trends in unique ways. This study provides new insights into how Saudi youth engage with memes, both local and global, to form and express their cultural identity.

Our findings extend the work of Al-Sebai (2023), who highlighted the impact of memes on national identity among Saudi youth, by adding a deeper understanding of how students use memes to both celebrate and challenge cultural norms. The study also supports the argument made by Ayash (2022) that memes act as semiotic units of digital culture, offering a new perspective on how memes are not only consumed but actively participated in by youth to shape their cultural identity.

Conclusion

Summary of Findings:

This study reveals that digital memes play a crucial role in shaping the cultural identity of Saudi university students. The findings indicate that:

- Local memes significantly contribute to fostering cultural pride and reinforcing Saudi national identity.
- Global memes, while providing exposure to diverse cultural ideas, can sometimes weaken adherence to local traditions, especially when they promote values that conflict with local customs.
- Digital media engagement, especially the frequency of meme sharing, correlates with a stronger impact on cultural identity formation.

Memes serve as powerful tools for cultural expression, offering Saudi youth a platform to both celebrate their heritage and explore global cultural trends.

Recommendations

The study offers several important recommendations for students, educators, and content creators:

1. **Encourage the Creation of Localized Memes:** Content creators should focus on producing memes that reflect Saudi culture, values, and traditions. Educational institutions and media organizations can partner to promote the creation and sharing of local memes that help strengthen cultural identity among Saudi youth.
2. **Promote Critical Engagement with Memes:** It is crucial to educate students on the potential impact of global memes on their cultural identity. Promoting critical thinking

skills will help youth engage with memes in a thoughtful manner, allowing them to navigate global influences while preserving their cultural authenticity.

3. **Balance Local and Global Cultural Exchange:** While global memes expose students to new cultural ideas, it is essential to encourage a healthy exchange between local and global meme cultures. By promoting memes that blend both local and global elements, Saudi youth can maintain their cultural identity while embracing global trends.
4. **Foster Awareness of Cultural Sensitivity in Memes:** Content creators and students alike should be aware of the potential for memes to perpetuate stereotypes or challenge cultural norms in ways that may be harmful. Education on cultural sensitivity can help prevent the spread of offensive or divisive content.

By following these recommendations, Saudi youth can continue to use memes as a tool for cultural expression, while maintaining a strong sense of identity that respects both local traditions and global influences.

Proposals for Further Research:

To build on the findings of this study, future research could examine:

- A comparative study across different Saudi universities to understand regional differences in meme usage.
- The influence of meme creators (rather than consumers) on cultural identity, examining how youth can become content creators rather than just consumers.
- Longitudinal studies on how meme trends evolve and their long-term impact on cultural identity formation over time

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
